#### What is a 4-H Water Ambassador?



The 4-H Water Ambassador program is a leadership opportunity for teens 13 and older, focusing on the importance of water quality, water conservation and water careers. It is a project for teens in the Cottonwood Extension District (Barton & Ellis counties.)

If selected, the first step will be to attend two (2) training sessions. This team of trained teens will be expected to return to their communities and lead other young people in water educational activities at one or more of the following:

- o World Water Day Fun Fest at Stemberg Museum (tentatively, March 2024)
- o Wetlands Education Center Earth Day Celebration
- Classroom presentations
- After school programs
- 4-H Club meetings
- o County Fair displays at the Barton and Ellis County Fairs
- Other activities where youth are willing to learn!

Teens involved with the 2024 4-H Water Ambassador Team will:

- Learn about the water cycle
- Learn about ways to conserve water
- · Learn about the use of technology to monitor water resources
- · Learn how everyone can contribute to caring for our shared water resource
- Learn about potential careers in water
- Learn ways to use social media, videos, and other technology platforms to spread the word about the importance of our most precious resource – water!
