Barton County 4-H Shooting Sports


Air Rifle/Pistol - The air rifle and air pistol projects are disciplines of the 4-H Shooting Sports Program. It is for 4-H members aged 8 to 18 years. In this project, the youth learn firearm safety, parts of and the operation of firearms, three shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing) for the rifle portion, shooting range rules and etiquette, and have the opportunity to shoot in a safe, supervised environment. The weekly meetings are held at an indoor range set up specifically for the air rifle/air pistol projects. All rifles, pistols, pellets, targets, and equipment are provided by the Barton County 4-H Air Rifle program. The 1st six weeks are mandatory to complete all the required training needed for the project. There is a \$20 charge per member to cover the costs of pellets and targets. From January through March, there are opportunities to compete in matches with other 4-H members from across the state, with a state match that takes place in April for those who qualify. Practices are held at the Foundry Community Church at 5401 Broadway in Great Bend.

Small Bore Rifle/Pistol - THE 1ST SIX WEEKS OF THE AIR RIFLE/AIR PISTOL PROGRAM ARE MANDATORY FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE SMALL BORE PROJECT. Those six weeks start on November 11, 2025.

Starting Range Date for Small Bore > The 1st Wednesday in June 2026

The smallbore project is a discipline of the 4-H Shooting Sports Program. It is for 4-H members aged 10 to 18. This project extends the knowledge gained in the air rifle/air pistol project. In this project, the youth learn firearm safety, the parts of and operation of small bore (.22 caliber) rifles and/or pistols, three shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing) for rifle, how the environment and weather affect rifle performance, shooting range rules and etiquette, and have the opportunity to shoot in a safe, supervised environment. The weekly meetings are held at a local gun club with an area reserved for use by the 4-H small-bore program. In this project, most rifles are provided by the 4-H members (the program does have 3 rifles that can be used if someone needs one), and all pistols must be provided by 4-H members. Any firearms provided by 4-H members must pass inspection by the shooting instructors. Ammunition is provided by the 4-H member and must meet certain specifications. It can be purchased through the 4-H small-bore program. There is a \$10 charge per member to cover the costs of targets. During late summer, mainly August, there are opportunities to compete in matches with other 4-H members from across the state. A state match takes place in October for those who qualify.

Archery - Practices will start in early February at the 4-H Educational Buildings on Hwy 281. Watch for more information. **4-H Shooting Sports is a great tool for teaching discipline, firearm safety, and accountability. 2026 Western National Roundup



Cottonwood Extension Districts 4-H'ers from Barton County recently partnered up with 4-H members from Rice and Pawnee Counties to represent Kansas at the 2026 Western National Roundup in Denver, Colorado, on January 7-11.

The team representing the state of Kansas, consisted of Kylee Miessler, Ryann Stryker, Adessa Prosser, and Hadley Fleming.

The team placed 5th in the Written Exam & Slides Phase ; 6th in Team Stations Phase ; 3rd in Judging Phase ; 3rd in Team Problems Phase

This led to the team placing 4th Place Overall!

Top Individual awards went to: Ryann Stryker for her 10th place in Written Exam & Slides phase and Kylee Miessler for her 8th place in Stations phase & 4th in Judging phase leading to her 9th place Overall Individual ranking!!

*Hippology is the study of horses, best described as similar to “the owner’s manual” for horses. Covers everything equine, including history and origins, breeds, anatomy and physiology, genetics, reproductive, riding disciplines, nutrition, tack and equipment, horse industry and horse management.

We’re incredibly proud of all their hard work and how well they represented not only the state, but their units and themselves! Thank you to all those who helped support their trip financially! 4-H Dog Project!

Our goal is to provide 4-H youth with the knowledge and skills to be a responsible pet owner and have hands-on experience with training. Participants will learn to train their dogs in obedience, showmanship, agility, and rally obedience. They will get to show the skills they have learned and taught their canine while participating in the local dog show. All youth are able to participate, including clover buds. All dog breeds are allowed, they just have to be over 6 months to do showmanship and obedience or 15 months for agility. This is a great project to help youth learn responsibility, decision making, communication skills and strengthen their human-animal bond.

4-H Horse Project!

Love horses, but don't own a horse? No problem, a big portion of the 4-H Horse project is learning all about the horse, also known as Hippology. Barton County has a very active group that gets together all year to learn about equine. Topics include breeds, horse coat colors and markings, health and nutrition, anatomy, reproduction, tack and equipment, horse safety, and the different uses and disciplines, to name a few. What do we do with all the knowledge we gain each year? A weekend retreat is held at Rock Springs 4-H Camp, known as Panorama. This event is a fun-filled weekend with other horse project members across the State of Kansas. Youth participate in activities such as horse-related quiz bowl competition, multiple-choice exam of horse questions, stationary examples of matching parts of the horse, types of feeds, etc, demonstrations and project talks involving the horse or the horse industry, equine-related photography contests, equine poster contests, equine advertisement competitions, horse logo competition, and slide show presentation contests. There is something for any member with a passion for our equine friends.
