Kansas Youth Leadership Forum Report

On November 22-23, Cottonwood District 4-Her's joined members from across the state as delegates at the Kansas Youth Leadership Forum! KYLF is an opportunity for 4-H youth to build their leadership skills and potential through workshops, consulting groups, inspirational speakers, and much more. Our 4-H'ers also get to vote for State 4-H Youth Council representatives from the Northwest region that will represent them and help plan next year's state 4-H events. KYLF is held at Rock Springs 4-H Ranch for youth 4-H age 14-18.

Barton County 4-H Shooting Sports

Air Rifle/Pistol - The air rifle and air pistol projects are disciplines of the 4-H Shooting Sports Program. It is for 4-H members aged 8 to 18 years. In this project, the youth learn firearm safety, parts of and the operation of firearms, three shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing) for the rifle portion, shooting range rules and etiquette, and have the opportunity to shoot in a safe, supervised environment. The weekly meetings are held at an indoor range set up specifically for the air rifle/air pistol projects. All rifles, pistols, pellets, targets, and equipment are provided by the Barton County 4-H Air Rifle program. The 1st six weeks are mandatory to complete all the required training needed for the project. There is a \$20 charge per member to cover the costs of pellets and targets. From January through March, there are opportunities to compete in matches with other 4-H members from across the state, with a state match that takes place in April for those who qualify. Practices are held at the Foundry Community Church at 5401 Broadway in Great Bend.

<u>Small Bore Rifle/Pistol</u> - THE 1ST SIX WEEKS OF THE AIR RIFLE/AIR PISTOL PROGRAM ARE MANDATORY FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE SMALL BORE PROJECT. Those six weeks start on November 11, 2025.

Starting Range Date for Small Bore > The 1st Wednesday in June 2026

The smallbore project is a discipline of the 4-H Shooting Sports Program. It is for 4-H members aged 10 to 18. This project extends the knowledge gained in the air rifle/air pistol project. In this project, the youth learn firearm safety, the parts of and operation of small bore (.22 caliber) rifles and/or pistols, three shooting positions (prone, kneeling, and standing) for rifle, how the environment and weather affect rifle performance, shooting range rules and etiquette, and have the opportunity to shoot in a safe, supervised environment. The weekly meetings are held at a local gun club with an area reserved for use by the 4-H small-bore program. In this project, most rifles are provided by the 4-H members (the program does have 3 rifles that can be used if someone needs one), and all pistols must be provided by 4-H members. Any firearms provided by 4-H members must pass inspection by the shooting instructors. Ammunition is provided by the 4-H member and must meet certain specifications. It can be purchased through the 4-H small-bore program. There is a \$10 charge per member to cover the costs of targets. During late summer, mainly August, there are opportunities to compete in matches with other 4-H members from across the state. A state match takes place in October for those who qualify.

<u>Archery</u> - Practices will start in early February at the 4-H Educational Buildings on Hwy 281. Watch for more information. 4-H Shooting Sports is a great tool for teaching discipline, firearm safety, and accountability. - 3) Assembling the 4-H Project Award submission:

The following items must be turned in for a complete submission in the following order:

- a) Check Sheet
- b) Personal Information Page
- c) Cover Letter
- d) Resume
- e) Project Report Form

Please do not include:

- 4-H Permanent Records
- Plastic page sleeves

Why enroll in October-December?

The goal of 4-H is project learning throughout the year, not just to produce a fair entry!

The sooner your family is enrolled, the sooner you are added to email lists for communication about upcoming 4-H events, activities, and project-related correspondence.

Clubs should not elect officers from non-enrolled 4-H members. I realize that may be hard to do so early in the 4-H year. Be sure to get enrolled ASAP if you were elected to a club office.

You also need to be enrolled to take part in certain projects, like livestock and shooting sports. You should be enrolled by the respective livestock weigh-in and tagging dates, and before attending any 4-H Shooting Sports meetings/practices.

Selecting Projects - Setting Goals

Using the <u>Setting 4-H Project Goals</u> publication is a great way to start your project year!

Keep in mind that winning Grand Champion or a purple ribbon is not a goal. Goals should be <u>SMART</u>: **Specific** (crochet a scarf), **Measurable** (a complete scarf that fits me appropriately), **Achievable** (I can do this myself or with help from a family member), **Relevant** (I am enrolled in the Fiber Arts project), **Time-bound** (progress every week from Feb/May)

Why start Project Records early in the year?

By having Project Records out in October, you have the opportunity to look ahead for activities and events that provide learning opportunities or where you need to practice at home.

For older youth, you may need to include leadership activities related to the project, and this is much easier to plan over the winter months instead of when the year is nearly complete. Citizenship opportunities may also be hard to find. So, it's a good idea to give yourself time to identify those or come up with ideas.

Many of you utilize the form-fillable PDF Project Report Forms. Have you ever considered using **ZBooks**? Check out the Kansas 4-H website for some great <u>resources</u> on how to get started! It's a great tool for year-long project record completion on the fly.

Leader's Corner



Club Leaders - It is very important that you set up a Volunteer Profile in 4-H Online and verify that you have completed the volunteer training in 4-H Online! This helps us to better manage volunteer certification and status. We also need to make sure that you have completed an initial Certified Background Check. There is no cost to you for this. Please reach out to me, and I can share the link to initiate the screening. Please remember that in order for a 4-H Club to be in good standing, you must have TWO leaders who are current, screened, and approved 4-H Volunteers.

Please visit with your club's 4-H Council Representatives so that they are aware of their role and responsibility to attend 4-H council and fulfill their elected duties. They serve as the conduit of information between the club and the county-wide 4-H program.

How can you help your club members prepare for 4-H Club Day?

- Remind them to sign up via Sign-Up Genius link on page
- Share the resources on the Kansas 4-H Communications page.
- Encourage them to practice!

Project Records - Have everyone bring their Goal Setting Sheets and Project Records to your next meeting. Check on updates and share upcoming opportunities. This can be fun and interactive! Maybe have a small prize drawing for those who share updates. Setting-4-H Project Goals

Volunteer hour tracking - I ask that our registered volunteers begin sending me how many youth are at your meetings (project meetings included), and how long you meet for. I'm just looking for "where we met, had 5 kids there, and met for 2 hours". This helps with reporting, and I would also like to start getting a feel for the hours our volunteers are putting in. I don't expect you to report every single hour spent toward 4-H, because I know that number is high, and I don't want to add a ton extra to your already full plates. 


