





CLUB LEADERS—It is very important that you set up a Volunteer Profile in 4-H Online and verify that you have completed the volunteer training in 4-H Online! This helps us manage volunteer resources, training, and certification. Please remember that in order for a 4-H Club to be in good standing you must have TWO leaders who have current 4-H volunteer certification. As we begin the new 4-H year on Oct. 1, please complete your paperwork as well as working with 4-H families!

Please visit with your club's 4-H Council Representatives so that they are aware of their role and responsibility to attend 4-H Council and fulfill their elected duties. They serve as the conduit of information between the club and the county-wide 4-H Council.

2025-2026 4-H Enrollment

Why enroll in October?

The goal of 4-H is project learning throughout the year, not just to produce a fair entry!

The sooner your family is enrolled, the sooner you are added to email lists for communication.

Clubs should not elect officers from non-enrolled 4-H members (that's hard to keep in mind during October officer elections!)

Selecting Projects—setting goals

Using the goal setting sheet (https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/download/setting-4-h-project-goals-4H1100) is a great way to start your project year!

Keep in mind that winning Grand Champion or a purple ribbon is not a goal. Goals should be SMART: **Specific** (bake a cake), **Measurable** (understand and improve the texture of my cake), **Achievable** (I can do this myself or with help from a family member); **Relevant** (I am enrolled in the Foods & Nutrition project); **Timely** (one/week in Feb-May)

Why start Project Records in October?

By having Project Records out in October, you have the opportunity to look ahead for activities and events that provide learning/practice or where you need to practice at home.

For older youth, you may need to include leadership activities related to the project and this is much easier to plan in October or November than in September when the year is nearly complete.

4-H Online closed for access sometime in late September to prepare for the new 4-H year. As we get closer, watch for an announcement that 2025-2026 4-H Online enrollment is open!

As we begin the 2025–2026 4-H year, it's important to understand how publicity permissions are handled and how we, as Extension professionals, can responsibly share the stories and successes of you, our 4-H members.

What Is the Publicity Release?

When families enroll in 4-H Online, they are asked to agree (or not agree) to a **publicity release**. This release gives permission for the use of a member's name, image, and likeness by:

- Local Extension Units
- Kansas State University (including the State 4-H Office)
- The Kansas 4-H Foundation

This includes use in photos, videos, social media, websites, press releases, and more. If a family selects "I Do Not Agree," their child's name and image cannot be used. Some examples include:

- Kansas State Fair & County Fair entry cards, schedules, or results
- Local or state contests
- Social Media posts
- News articles or promotional materials

Additional Consent Questions

To provide more clarity, families are asked to give specific permission for:

- First and last name
- Extension unit
- 4-H club or town name
- Media (photos, video, audio, etc.)
- Print-only media
- Social media
- · County fair-related publicity

These responses **override** the general publicity release and help guide what can or cannot be shared publicly.
